Our **Protégé**

The Lamar University Department of Art & Design was excited to again help support the Annual Protégé Competition, a juried high school exhibition sponsored by Market Basket and held by the Art Museum of Southeast Texas (AMSET).

Protégé is open to entries from twelfth-grade students in Jefferson and surrounding counties. Students are allowed to submit one work to be considered for the exhibition and the final selection is exhibited with an opening reception and an awards ceremony. The works are exhibited at AMSET and travel to regional high schools and the Dishman Art Museum on Lamar University's Campus. The winners of the 2025 Protégé Competition are, First Place – The Space Between by Alleigh Rios of Hamshire-Fannett High School, Second Place – Yawnzzn by Ayra Momin of Port Neches-Groves High School, Third Place – Nightmare by Kindal Moreau of Barbers

Hill High School, and Honorable Mentions – Death of America by Kaylee Hargett of Hardin-Jefferson High School, Shelby by Allison Kruger of Port Neches-Groves High School and Destination by Camila Perez of Nederland High School.

The first, second and third place winners all receive scholarships to Lamar University, courtesy of the Department of Art & Design and the Friends of the Arts, ranging from \$500 to \$1000. In addition to scholarship awards, varying denominations of gift certificate monies are awarded by AMSET, courtesy of Blick Art Materials. The teacher of the first place winner also receives \$100 for classroom art supplies and many of the teachers helping students enter work are Lamar University Department of Art & Design alumni.

The artist who is this year's first-place winner is Alleigh Rios of Hamshire-Fannett High School. She is also a Presidential Scholar Recipient and will be attending Lamar University this Fall!

Presidential Scholars receive a full scholarship for four years covering tuition, fees, room and board, and books. The requirements to apply for this prestigious scholarship are competitive and applicants must have a minimum high school GPA of 4.40 and rank in the top 10% of their graduating class.

We wish Alleigh the best of luck in her academic career at Lamar University and look forward to seeing all the wonderful work she creates during her time with us. We also look forward to seeing more work created by all of the Protégé applicants and hope they decide to continue their education at Lamar University in the Department of Art & Design.

Protégé will be on view at the Dishman Art Museum from April 15th through the 21st. The Department of Art & Design will also host a Character Art Workshop at the Dishman on April 17th for the exhibiting artists, current Lamar University students, and the Lamar State College Port Arthur students of LU alumna and workshop leader Mary Catherine Wilbur.



At the end of March, the Department of Communication & Media hosted their Creative Conversations series.

The Creative Conversations series is an opportunity for our current students to hear from alumni who are out in the field. One session is held each semester and features alumni who work in specific aspects of the creative communication discipline. We have had film makers, television reporters, and entrepreneurs. The talk consists of two or three individuals who each tell the students a bit about who they are and what they do. That is followed by a question-and-answer portion.

This year, the Department was pleased to welcome back Josh Yawn, Wyatt Cagle, and Kenneth Dupuis; all active and dedicated alumni.

You may know these alumni as the creative force behind the LU Super Bowl commercials, the promotional videos currently being made for the College of Fine Arts & Communication, and numerous films including the award-winning The Example about the 1943 Beaumont Race Riot.

In addition to discussions about their strong resumes and outstanding professional projects, they focused most of their time on discussing the business side of show business with current students.

They informed the students about the challenges of setting up and running your own business including the intricacies of establishing your brand, billing, purchasing materials and equipment and scheduling large groups of people. They also explained that you must be open to collaboration while enhancing your own strengths and improving on your weaknesses.

Our wonderful alumni taught our students that it is possible to pursue your creative dreams while earning a living, but it requires a tremendous amount of hard work and dedication. Josh, Wyatt, and Kenneth made it clear that even with the business aspect, it is still worth the time and effort to pursue your craft.

SPOTLIGHT ON ACCESS



he Department of Deaf Studies & Deaf Education has been conducting some exciting partnerships with Southeast Texas Stages and the Lamar University Department of Theatre & Dance under the direction of Dr. Zanthia Smith, Associate Professor and Program Director for Bachelor of Arts in American Sign Language.

Previously, the Department offered a course in Drama and Media Interpretation, where students were able to interpret well known musicals and shows such as "Les Misérables". But enrollment grew scarce until recent years.

"Suddenly, we have a new generation of students who are extremely interested in Theatre!" Says Dr. Smith.

Because of this increased interest, students were able to perform, through interpretation, "Scooby Doo and the Witch's Ghost" for groups of local high school students.

"We had everything 'Scooby' that night!" Explains Dr. Smith. Including door prizes and homemade 'Scooby Snacks' that were passed out.

"We were able to recruit three students to the undergraduate program

from that performance," says Dr. Smith. "So it's not only an opportunity for our students to enrich and enhance their interpretation and translation skills, but also an opportunity to recruit students into our program."

Through a partnership with the Department of Theatre & Dance, Dr. Smith and her students have been able to provide interpretations every semester for their theatrical productions. In addition, they also provide their interpreting skills to Southeast Texas Stages, formerly Beaumont Community Players, allowing the Deaf and Hard of Hearing communities to enjoy a traditional theatre experience.

Interested students go through an audition process and are selected to perform specific parts.

"We try different pairs to see who interacts well together and then we make those assignments based on their interaction and their skill with the language," explains Dr. Smith.

Interpreters are required to dress in all black, but often include small props or accessories to help bring their characters to life.

"We use simple props so that the Deaf and Hard of Hearing individuals are watching the play and watching us interpret can make connections between us and the characters on stage," says Dr. Smith.

In addition to this style of interpreting, Dr. Smith has also appeared in shows at Southeast Texas Stages, like "The Miracle Worker" and "Constellations" as a shadow interpreter.

"We pair with the actor so that it's, in essence, two plays occurring at the same time on the same stage, but in two different languages," explains Dr. Smith. "It helps bring the Deaf community and the Theatre community together. It's important that there are not just hearing actors, but Deaf actors as well. For the community to see themselves in those roles, to see themselves on stage, to see themselves as part of the general community."

Dr. Zanthia Smith and her students provide a wonderful example of how the College of Fine Arts & Communication collaborates, innovates and creates. Keep up the good work!



Spring into the season of love! The Mary Morgan Moore Department of Music is proud to announce their annual LoveU concert.

"Simply, we want to say 'we love you!,'" says Dr. James Han, Director of Choral Activities and Holmes Family Endowed Professorship in Choral Activities.

The LoveU concert features love songs from around the world.

"Every song we present tells the story of love; love of parents, spouses, friends, and God," explains Dr. Han.

Attendants can expect to hear a small portion of "Ode to Joy" from Beethoven's 9th Symphony, "Evening Song" by Johannes Brahms, a Korean art song titled, "First Love", and many more. The choir students, still inspired from last summer's trip to South Korea, are particularly excited to perform "First Love" in the LoveU concert.

In addition to many talented choir students, Dr. Han has also spent additional time to prepare five selected choral Music Education students on their conducting artistry. Because these students excelled in their studies, they will each conduct one piece in the LoveU concert which has been carefully assigned by Dr. Han and prepared throughout the semester.

LoveU will take place at the Dishman Art Museum on May 4th at 4:00 p.m.

"The Dishman Art Museum is our favorite places to be. It's where the fine arts get a chance to collaborate. When art meets music and music meets art," says Dr. Han.

Attendants are encouraged to arrive thirty minutes early to secure seating, as seating is limited.

LEVEL UP!

In addition to robust undergraduate and graduate programs, the Department of Speech & Hearing Sciences also offers a Pre-Graduate Preparation: Leveling Program.

Both graduate degrees in the department require students to have an undergraduate degree in a related field; but the leveling program helps bridge that gap.

"The leveling program is a win-win from the department perspective and the student perspective," says Dr. Johanna Boult, Chair of the Department of Speech & Hearing Sciences. "Having the leveling program allows us to recruit strong, well-rounded prospective graduate students from other disciplines."

Some of the disciplines that have an interest in the graduate programs include education, linguistics, biology, public health, nursing, and many others; or sometimes something completely unrelated to the fields of Speech-Language Pathology or Audiology. Some may believe that not having an undergraduate degree in the field would be a hindrance to the student's overall success in their career, but this couldn't be further from the truth.

"People become excellent speech-language pathologists and audiologists even without an undergraduate degree in the major," says Dr. Boult, "If someone already has a bachelor's degree in another discipline and they're interested in a career change, the leveling program is an excellent way to clear the path toward becoming a speech-language pathologist or audiologist."

At the end of the day, what matters most is a passion for Speech-Language Pathology or Audiology and a desire to help people communicate.

Students in the leveling program are required to complete up to seven courses in Speech & Hearing Sciences in addition to four courses from the General Curriculum. The program typically takes two full semesters to complete. The program also offers additional flexibility by offering online courses in the summer.

After completing the program, students are qualified to apply for either the Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology or the Doctorate of Audiology (Au.D.).
