Hello!





"The idea of the brand is to allow the consumer to choose how they want to be known in the music world. I was inspired by the idea of consumers being able to add their own 'signature' elements rather than buying a pre-made instrument off the shelf." At the exhibition, you will see a hand-made a prototype guitar along with mock-ups of how the app would function and poster designs.


After graduating from the University of Texas-Rio Grande Valley, Jaramiah jumped into the professional world and worked as a deaf services provider, a paraprofessional in the school system, and as a chat host. While working as a chat host, Jaramiah made friends with Lamar University alumni who ultimately helped push him to pursue a graduate degree. Jaramiah took a leap and moved seven hours away from his family to come to Lamar University. "I'm the only one in my family who has pursued a graduate degree," he explains, "I realized that I'm the first deaf person in my family and a first-generation student. I didn't realize my life could take this path."

In his first year at Lamar University, Jaramiah has been able to complete a lot of research with both doctoral and undergraduate students. "As the only graduate student pursuing my masters, I do a lot of back and forth between the two groups. It's interesting because I get to see things from a lot of different perspectives," Jaramiah explains. He has also been able to help a lot around the department from assisting Dr. Diane Clark and other faculty with projects and errand to assisting the ASL tutors and other student workers.

Jaramiah is extremely dedicated to his work. He is currently beginning work on his thesis topic, "Bimodal, Bilingual," which will discuss gaps in education for deaf children. "Growing up, my family got hearing aids for me and focused on the pattern of listening and speaking first, but it didn't really form that foundation of language. I'm still learning, even as I feel like I'm failing. Everyone has something they struggle with," he explains. His thesis will focus on the idea of parents starting their children's education with Sign Language first, then introducing spoken language so that the brain can be primed and ready to learn the spoken language. "I really try to challenge myself and push myself to succeed, because so often deaf children are not exposed to what life can be like as a deaf adult and I want to be an example for them so that they can be the best they can be," Jaramiah says.

Jaramiah wants to inform the hearing community about deaf culture and the need for sign language. "There are so many negative stigmas around being deaf. People think that their deaf children won't be able to get jobs, make friends, go to school and more if they can't hear. Those negative stigmas create negative outcomes for deaf children. But if parents get a chance to meet with a deaf adult, a world of possibilities opens in their minds," he explains.

We have loved seeing Jaramiah's growth and passion over the past year and look forward to seeing all of the wonderful accomplishments and goals he is sure to meet. Thank you for taking the leap to Lamar, Jaramiah!



Ashley had a lot of new experiences at Lamar University that challenged her. At Lamar she was able to take her first modern dance course, her first tap dance course, continue her training in ballet, and more. "Modern dance is my favorite style. It really taught me how to be more expressive, not only in dance, but also in my body and how I speak to others," she explains. She was even mentored by former Associate Professor, Travis Prokop, and learned how to master the art of aerial dance. "My biggest fear was falling during a performance. She has also served as the vice-president and president of Chi Tau Epsilon (XTE) the Dance Honor Society at Lamar. "We have a lot of supporters.
