The Department also hosts multiple breakout sessions for



EDUCATING across BORDERS





The adventure began early Monday morning, July 29, 2024. Students arrived in Halifax, Nova Scotia harried but healthy. After finding their lodging, students explored the Halifax Boardwalk. The weather was unseasonably hot. We expected the temperature to be in the 70's but experienced summer weather in the mid to high 90's without air conditioning. The housing consisted of a pod of single rooms with a shared bathroom. Co-ed housing is a commonality in Canada, and was a new experience for some of our students.

Students were hesitant about the conference at first. This was Deaf World. Everyone signed; 24/7 language immersion. Lectures were presented in American Sign Language (ASL), Quebec Sign Language (LSQ), and Maritime Sign Language (MSL). These languages share some commonalities, causing students to wonder which interpreter to follow. Beyond the workshops, the conference expanded our understanding of Deaf art. ASL performances included storytelling, such as Black Deaf Phenomenology and Indigenous storytelling through hoop dancing. Paintings and graphics created by Deaf individuals were also on display.

The conference lasted four days. In the heat, attending sessions became difficult at times, but the workshops and the opportunities to interact with members of the Canadian Deaf Community and Deaf professionals

from around the world were invaluable. Topics included digital sign language curriculums, signed music interpretation, navigating technology, sign language preservation, Indigenous sign languages of Canada, DeafSpace, preserving Deaf Culture and Deaf rights, and sign language competency. Among the many things that we learned, we discovered that many of the rights provided to deaf individuals in the United States (as per ADA, IDEA, and the Rehabilitation Act) do not possess equivalents in the provinces of Canada. Each province is an independent unit; laws or provisions established in one province do not affect the others.

In addition to the conference, we were able to go on excursions. We traveled on an 'Island Hopper,' a vehicle that traveled by land and sea, ate dinner down on the Boardwalk and were able to observe some of the Busker Festival, traveled on a Tall Sailing Ship, and we took the ferry to Nova Scotia Community College where we toured the campus. We were treated to lunch with staff from the Nova Scotia Community College Interpreting Program, Dr. Beverly Buchanan (whom we miss terribly), and the officers of the Canadian Deaf Society. They also taught us some Maritime Signs.

Traveling home, we had to arrive at the airport before the crow wakes. While they had to rush through customs and across international airport spaces, the students arrived home to Houston safe and sound.





Dr. Michael Bartnik currently serves as Chair of the Mary Morgan Moore Department of Music at Lamar University. Before his current role, he held the position of Department

During his tenure at Nicholls State University, Dr. Bartnik actively contributed to the academic community, serving on Faculty Senate

and various university committees. He also played a pivotal role in the development of innovative courses and degree concentrations within the Department of Music. His passion for teaching extended beyond the classroom, as he conducted masterclasses at respected institutions such as the University of Maryland, Boston Conservatory at Berklee, and the Universidade Federal do Rio de Janeiro.

Since 2009, Dr. Bartnik has been a member of the Baton Rouge Symphony Orchestra, contributing to a chamber recording released under the Sono Luminos label. His musical journey includes principal positions with Texarkana Symphony Orchestra, Round Rock Symphony, and Acadiana Symphony Orchestra; and a frequent performer with the Louisiana Philharmonic Orchestra. Additional performances include the national Broadway tours of Wicked, Phantom of the Opera, and Little House on the Prairie as well as ensemble performances throughout Europe and chamber recitals throughout Rio de Janeiro, Brazil.



What drew you to Lamar University, and what excites you most about joining the team here?

I think there are a lot of great things happening at Lamar currently. The alumni and donor support is great. Lamar is a well-funded university. I feel like the President, Jaime Taylor is doing a lot of wonderful things. Our faculty is also very large. At my previous institution I oversaw 10 faculty members and now I'm working with 19, and it's a really strong faculty. They're so supportive of their students.

What is your vision for the music department at Lamar University? Are there any specific programs or initiatives you are looking to introduce or expand upon?

Over the next 5-10 years I see a lot of opportunity for growth. There's a lot to work with here. The online graduate program we have is also fairly new, so I want to look to see how far we can expand that program, not just to the region, but to the state of Texas and beyond. But ultimately, I know that a new performing arts center is a necessity. I think that's the next step to really highlight the Department, the College and the University. I'd also like to continue to see a growth in enrollment.

How do you plan to balance maintaining the department's traditions while also innovating and bringing in new ideas?

I think feedback is very important. I want to continue the traditions and ideas of the Mary Morgan Moore Department of Music while working with the faculty to bring new and creative ideas, events and plans to the department. I also think it's important to look to other University's Music Departments and see how we compare and what sets us apart, that way we can understand why our students ultimately choose Lamar University and how we can keep a fresh mindset as we continue to bolster enrollment.

How do you plan to foster collaboration within the department and with other departments at Lamar University?

Collaboration is always fun. At my previous institution, the Music Department was under the College of Liberal Arts. We shared a building with the Communications Department, the Art Department and even the Culinary Department, so we naturally bounced ideas off one another. Getting to collaborate with the Culinary Department was always fun, interesting and tasty! I think all the departments in the College of Fine Arts & Communication have excellent leadership, and I'm excited to get to know the other department chairs and see what kinds of possibilities there are for collabora-

What role do you see the music department playing in the local community?

It's important to bring music to the schools and community, but it's also important to bring the community to campus. Ultimately, it's about creating and fostering those relationships.

Final thoughts?

I'm very happy with the support from the Dean's office. I think Dean Wright is doing an excellent job leading the College. I've also been very impressed with the sense of community that this area has. All the locals seem to support the arts in Beaumont and Lamar University. I'm looking forward to expanding on existing connections that the Music Department has.

FROM classroom TO clinic

PAVING THE WAY FOR FUTURE SLPAs WITH NEW PROGRAM

The Department of Speech & Hearing Sciences is proud to offer a new Speech-Language Pathology Assistant (SLPA) Program.

This program is available to Undergraduate students in the department who are maybe on the fence about attending graduate school or want to take some time to work in the field prior to obtaining their Masters and Doctoral degrees. "Our Undergraduate program is geared towards preparing students for the Graduate programs we offer, but we saw a need to provide an



opportunity for students who weren't quite sure what they wanted to do post-graduation. So this gives our students another opportunity. This means they can also work as an SLPA while they're in the Graduate programs and gain well-rounded clinical experience before they begin to practice as SLPs themselves," says Carmyn Thompson, CCC-SLP, Clinical Supervisor and Instructor, and Director of the SLPA Program. The year-long program began in the fall of 2023 with a cohort of three students and has since doubled with six students beginning the program this fall.

All three of the students in the first cohort were unsure about continuing their education beyond the Bachelor's degree. Through this program, all three candidates were able to learn all the pertinent skills of an SLPA along with transferable communication and recording skills. The Department is happy to announce that post-graduation, all three SLPA program graduates have been hired and are working in their chosen field as SLPAs.

"All three of them thrived. They all got jobs as soon as they graduated. That was exciting to see," says Thompson.

This program allows students to receive all necessary training, as outlined by the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation, to apply for their SLPA license, including clinical observation, working experience with the SLP Graduate Students and more.

"Not only is this program beneficial to our students, but it also provides the Southeast Texas community with licensed and trained SLPAs who are able to provide effective services and treatment to all ages," says Thompson.

DISHMAN ART MUSEUM PREPARES FOR TWO NEW EXHIBITIONS IN SEPTEMBER

After the Faculty Exhibition closes on September 7th, the Dishman Art Museum will begin preparations for two new exhibitions.

Where the Amish Vacation, Photographs by Dina Litovsky will be on display in the First Floor Gallery from September 20th through November 4th. Every winter, Amish and Mennonite travelers from all over the United States, travel to Pinecraft, a small community in Sarasota, Florida. Starting out as a tourist camp in the 1920s, it has since become a popular vacation spot. Jokingly dubbed "Amish Las Vegas", Pinecraft is a unique place where all different denominations of Anabaptist escape the winter together and mingle amongst each other. The usual rules are a bit looser, turning a blind eye to the use of cell phones, cameras and bicycles while encouraging recreational activities.

Dina Litovsky is a Ukrainian-born photographer who has lived in New York City since 1991. Her imagery can be described as visual sociology. Litovsky's work explores the idea of leisure, often focusing on subcultures and social gatherings.

In 2020, she won the Nannen Prize, Germany's foremost award for documentary photography, for "Where the Amish Vacation."

Жити: To Live, Photographs by Patrick Patterson will be on display in the Second Floor Gallery from September 20th through November 4th. Patrick Patterson, a 2006 graduate of Lamar University with a B.S. in Communication, traveled to Ukraine in 2022 and spent 14 months documenting the war. He traversed the country from east to west, north to south, recording the effects of conflict in war-torn regions. Now back in the United States, he's sharing the stories he gathered while abroad. Through his photography, Patterson hopes to amplify the voices of everyday people living under Russian occupation.

The opening reception for both shows will be held on Friday, September 27th from 6:30p.m. to 8:30p.m. Join us for light refreshments and a chance to see these amazing works.


