There's Always Something New to Learn on Study Abroad

"Why would you go on a study abroad program for Sport Culture and History if you don't really care all that much about sports?"

If I had a dollar for every time someone asked me that question I would've made enough money to pay my whole program fee. Well, maybe that's an exaggeration, but you get the point. To be honest, it's a fair question for anyone who knows me. I'm a history major and quite possibly the biggest history nerd you'll ever meet, but I'm only mildly interested in anything sports related. So again, why did I do Lamar's Sports History in London program this summer? The shortest and most

logical answer is because I needed the course credit that was being offered and this program let me earn that credit in London over a two week period instead of during a regular summer or full semester in Beaumont. But it goes a little beyond that really. Sure, studying abroad is about traveling to cool places and earning course credits in unconventional ways, but it's also about getting out of your comfort zone and experiencing new things. The National Football Museum in Manchester certainly wasn't anywhere near the top of my list of things to see in the UK, but my goal after graduation is to work in museums, so having the NFM's Collections Manager sit down with our group and talk about what she does was invaluable. After all, the work Collections Departments do is pretty much the same regardless of a museum's focus. We also got to see things that weren't sports related and were instead important parts of British culture and heritage. We toured Hampton Court Palace (one of Henry VIII's palaces), the Tower of London, we saw the Rosetta Stone and the Elgin Marbles at the British Museum, and after a lecture in Leicester over the effects of Cold War politics on international sporting events, we toured the city's Richard III Visitor's Center and saw where King Richard III's body was discovered recently after his burial location was lost for over 500 years. Our group had a mixture of students who were there for the sports and who were there for the history and we all had a great time and learned a lot at the locations we visited. Even though the history and culture of sports isn't one of my preferred topics to study, I had an amazing time on our program in London because I was experiencing new things with some really wonderful people, while making important connections between my love of history and my potential career in museums.
